

Evaluating Websites: What Websites Can I Trust?

Ouestions to Ask:

- 1. What type of domain does it come from?
 - Government sites: .gov .mil
 - Educational sites: .edu
 - Nonprofit organizations: .org
 - Business or commercial sites: .com
 - State government sites: .oh.us
 - Network organizations/internet providers: .net
- **2. Is it somebody's personal page?** Look at the URL closely for a name or nickname or is the server a commercial ISP like aol.com? This tilde ~ usually indicates a personal site.
- **3. Is the page current?** Are dates listed? Have there been modifications or updates made and are the dates listed usually at the bottom?
- 4. Are there links given such as "Links", "Additional Sites", and "Resources"? Are the links current and working?
- **5. Does the page function well?** Is the page easy to navigate? Is the site searchable?

OK, I found a site. Now what do I do?

- 1. Scan the site. Does it look like a Lexile that you can read and understand?
- **2.** Does the site include more than one opinion on a topic? If a site is strongly opinionated about only one side of a topic, it could be biased.
- 3. Does the written work on the site include footnotes which give credit to a different source other than the website? This is important to note when you are stating facts and citing sources.
